It has been another difficult vear, and vet despite the imperative on Muslims by dint of Divine

command and obvious necessity, Muslims do not unite. The manifestations of such are everywhere – the internecine fighting and bloodshed in Syria and Libya, the continued disintegration of Iraq and Pakistan, the rise of sectarian hatred in Indonesia and Malaysia, the list goes on. It appears that the need to understand – another clear Divine command – is one that we have vet to internalise.

All these events and so many more - the coup in Egypt is yet another – serve agendas external and inimical to Muslims and all

those who strive for justice. How is it that a community that claims to struggle for justice cannot develop the theoretical and practical understanding necessary to do so? Rather we extend the idea – a truly Enlightenment, not enlightened one – that the ends justifies the means, and that our own personal and sectarian causes define what Truth and Justice are. Where not so long ago there was some semblance of Unity – on Palestine for example - we have been lured into the trap of demeaning the momentous cruelty of 66 years of dispossession and all it entails, as insignificant in comparison to the crimes of whatever tyrant is de rigueur in western press and policy circles.

Our existence is split between our aspirations and a reality which not only is far from our aims but a reality that we obdurately worsen whilst claiming to hold onto Islamic values. We are trapped by ideas of the nation state, yet claim we are part of the Ummah. We accept the narratives of Western governments

that our lives and the systems we live in are much better than those of the countries so many of us may have hailed from. We do not see Islamophobia and anti-Muslim hatred as we should, as the byproduct of wars against Muslims elsewhere and the precursor to such military interventions. Without anti-Muslim racism becoming the norm, military interventions against Muslims elsewhere would not be so readily accepted or formulated.

When movements arise to change those situations 'over there' they are crushed or socialised to neo-liberal norms, or as in the case of Egypt, both. Yet we continue to play the same game, to blame and fight each other while the world burns, in part at our own hands. Each party in this intra-Muslim melee seeks not reconciliation with the other but with the powers that be - par-ticularly the US and its satraps. When David Cameron launched an enquiry into the Muslim Brotherhood in the UK with a view to criminalising the organisation, the failure to understand the enormity of enmity was staggering. Instead of exposing the British government for its support of a military coup at the behest of a ruthless dictatorship, activists limited their criticism to the meek request that a member of the Brotherhood should be on the inquiry panel.

Western Machinations

The time to excuse such manoeuvring as naïve is long gone. As easily as Westernised governments promoted a full scale war in Syria, they now just as easily demonise those young men and women, who emboldened by a political and media narrative, went to fight. It is nothing new. When the USSR was defeated and expelled from Afghanistan, those hailed as brave mujahideen by the BBC no less, were then demonised as Islamic extremists. How did we make the same mistake again? Played time and again, Muslims must surely at some point learn and seek guidance from the time of our Prophet (peace and blessings be upon Him) of when and how to fight in the struggle to attain justice in the service of the most Just. It is clear that we are losing sight of the bigger picture because we are being attacked from all sides on a daily basis. One day it is the government implying that all Muslims have a propensity for extremist behaviour in the Tackling Extremism in the UK report, and on another it is a fabricated story of children being

indoctrinated in a Birmingham school, or that the food we eat is unethical, or that we are collectively responsible for the violent actions of Boko Haram. The attacks we are subjected to are endless.

One of our problems is that we are failing to understand the rhetoric of prominent figures such as Tony Blair, who in his latest speech on the Middle East, articulated that the world should be united in tackling the 'problem' of political Islam. China, Russia and the West should put aside their difference and unify against politically active Muslims. Part of the strategy, he said, should include supporting the military junta in Egypt, which has set up kangaroo courts and sentenced over one thousand people to death for the alleged murder of one police officer. Conversely, not even one member of the police has been held accountable for the murders of thousands of civilians. Blair's support for this atrocity, as well as for the Syrian opposition, demonstrates this conflation of both Western and Zionist interests in the region. Anyone who supports this atrocity and the junta while at the same time championing the Syrian opposition cannot claim to support justice, democracy or the people of the region, but instead simply exposes their vested interests in propping up the Western and Zionist agenda.

However, this sort of rhetoric should be expected from the likes of Tony Blair. What is more disturbing is the actions of Muslim states such as Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates, who have put into practice Blair's policy, and funded the military coup of the only democratically elected government in Egypt's history. They have also identified the Muslim Brotherhood as a terrorist organisation. This is the same Muslim Brotherhood they are supporting against Bashar al-Assad in Syria.

Arab Spring Disillusionment

What is also shocking is our inability to think outside arenas of nationalism and sectarianism, and look at the bigger picture in order to realise that no Muslim, be they Egyptian or Syrian, Bahraini or Libyan, is better off than before the 'Arab Spring'. If anything, there has been more death, destruction and displacement, and the only smiles are on the faces of our enemies. They are agent provocateurs who promote disunity on all sides and create the ugliest of images under the banner of Islam. Boko Haram, the so-called mujahideen who eat the hearts of fellow human beings with an audience shouting 'Allahu Akbar', and those sectarian agents who in reality represent neither Shia nor Sunni, are all the same. And they are all given platforms in the west to promote their poisonous messages and lies. At the height of the conflict in

Bosnia, when Muslims were systematically being slaughtered and raped, the consensus was that this could have been prevented if they were united, and it was the West which was 'stopping us from being unified'. Mustafa Ceric, Mufti of Bosni Herzegovina asked: 'then why do you let them?' One of the most effective ways of identifying the enemies of Islam and Muslims is on the basis of those who work hard to finance disunity. Why are we not more organised? Why do we not stand up for our rights and the rights of others with the compassion of the likes of the Prophet of Allah, sent as a mercy to all creation? Standing for justice for ourselves and all human beings is a commandment of Allah (the Glorified and Exalted). We are all His vicegerents and united we have the capacity to create a better and just society for all mankind.

UNIVERSAL JUSTICE NETWORK

he Universal Justice Network (UJN) was set up in 2008 to deal with international issues in cooperation with civil society organisations. It has two secretariats, one in London, UK headed by IHRC and the second one in Penang, Malaysia headed by Citizens International (CI). Currently UJN has a network of 50 different organisations in more than 20 countries. A key focus of UJN's work has been the issue of sectarianism.

UJN has identified Malaysia, Indonesia and Pakistan as key areas where sectarian strife has been rising. Last year we successfully managed to bring together various high profile religious and political leaders from Pakistan, associated with groups and ten-dencies at loggerheads with one another, to engage in conflict resolution. Over a period of a week in Bodrum, Turkey, UJN facilitated workshops, training and a safe space in which to have frank discussions about their differences. Despite heated disagreements, by the end of the week, the various leaders agreed an eleven-point unity declaration that they all signed on behalf of their organisations and sects.

The declaration denounced the killing of fellow human beings on the basis of colour, creed, ethnicity or religion as haram. The statements also declared excommunication or takfir against fellow Muslims and abusing the Prophet Muhammad's family and companions to be against the Shariah. The declaration is based on Charter 3:103, an IHRC project initiated in 1997 that is based on



the verse 103, sura 3 of the Holy Qur'an calling for unity. The various leaders have committed to uphold these values, to be our ears on the ground and to report back on any issues. Our second meeting will be held with the same group and the participants have also invited UJN to go to Pakistan to step up the work of conflict resolution.

In May 2014 UJN made field trips to Malaysia and Indonesia to meet senior religious and political leaders. In Malaysia sectarianism has reached such ugly depths that in Sampang whole communities were uprooted and one person even killed due to their beliefs. There was hardly any governmental intervention and the violence was allowed to take place. UJN facilitated humanitarian aid to those affected, after they were forced to live in a shelter with no access to food, water, basic necessities and schooling.

In Malaysia UJN observed that sectarianism was actually institutionalised; the orders came from very high up, influenced by external financial and political pressure. Many people are losing their jobs due to their religious convictions, books are being banned and religious gatherings are being raided by the police resulting in imprisonment without trial. UJN met various Amman Message signatories who agreed this was getting out of hand and would be willing to speak out as a group to challenge this current trend. But many were hesitant to do so individually believing that to do so would adversely affect their positions and livelihoods.

In Indonesia sectarianism was

actually coming from the grassroots and did not appear to be institutionalised. Local scholars are banning Islamic books and gatherings, whilst all the time Christian missionary work is gaining ground (thousands have converted to Christianity and churches are springing up everywhere). Both the Indonesians and Malaysians have also requested UJN to assist with conflict resolution and we are currently in the planning stages of setting up a meeting with some key players in a similar way to what we did with the Pakistanis.

Extremists or takfiris thrive on portraying a world that is black and white. They justify their actions through innovations and selective readings of traditional texts. All of this has been addressed in the Amman Message (www.ammanmessage.com) by leading scholars who agreed on three fundamental points:

1. They specifically recognised the validity of all 8 Madhahib (legal schools) of Sunni, Shi'a and Ibadi Islam; of traditional Islamic Theology (Ash'arism); of Islamic Mysticism (Sufism), and of true Salafi thought, and came to a precise definition of who is a Muslim.

2. Based upon this definition they forbade takfir (declarations of apostasy) between Muslims.

3. Based upon the Madhahib they set forth the subjective and objective preconditions for the issuing of fatwas, thereby exposing ignorant and illegitimate edicts.

Bringing Injustice to Light: IHRCATTHE UNITED NATIONS

he Islamic Human Rights Commission (IHRC) is among the many social and economic Non-Governmental Organisations (NGOs) representing civil society to be given the privilege of consultative status at the United Nations Economic and Social

Council (ECOSOC).

Consultative status gives IHRC a unique opportunity within the UN system to do advocacy and lobbying work and present its concerns and issues in the area of human rights to the key decision makers inside the UN, its member states and to other NGOs. The main UN agency in the area of human rights is the Office of the High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR). IHRC has submitted state-

IHRC has submitted statements on countries where there are gross human rights violations such as Egypt, Saudi Arabia, Bahrain and Israel. IHRC has also



submitted statements on countries which are considerable stable democracies, some of them part of the European Union.

The OHCHR holds Universal riodic Reviews (UPR) of human rights over the course of the year. The most recent UPR statement to be submitted by IHRC's research team concerned Egypt. It highlighted IHRC concerns over the coup d'etat in Egypt of 3 July 2013, the overthrow of President Morsi and the Muslim Brotherhood-led government, and the subsequent massacre of political demonstrators at two protest sites at al-Nahda Square and Rabaa al-Adawiya Mosque in Cairo on 14 August 2013. IHRC recommended that there should be an international inquiry into the massacres and the military led government and that the international community should refuse to recognise the constitution introduced by the military regime. During the Human Rights Council, IHRC also hosts side panel meetings to highlight human rights situations in particular countries. This is an opportunity to interact with other NGOs

and delegates to highlight issues which are not widely covered by the mainstream media or other NGOs.

During the 25th Session of the uman Rights Council in March 2014, IHRC held three side panel events on Bangladesh, Malaysia and Pakistan. The side panel on Bangladesh consisted of legal experts including an international crimes lawyer raising their concerns about the irregularities in the iudicial process during the recent ICT war crimes trials and the systematic victimisation of the political opposition by the ruling party. In the side panel meeting on Malaysia, concerns were raised by the panellists on the country's anti-terrorism laws and rising sectarianism. The third side panel that IHRC organised at the 25th Session of the Human Rights Council was on targeted killings against Barelvi Muslims, Shia Muslims, Christians and other minorities by Takfiri groups in Pakistan.

MESSAGE FROM

Dear Supporters,

his past year has been especially tumultuous in terms of the challenges faced by Muslims across the world. We are experiencing increasing levels of violence, in physical form and in rhetoric, both harmful in their own ways. We are also seeing sectarian divisions, fuelled by the same individuals and entities who inflict violence upon us, and who are aided and abetted by those within our own communities who seek financial gain from a divided ummah.

Now more than ever the Islamic Human Rights Commission's commitment to a pan-Islamic identity seems essential. We are committed to working towards a united global community that strives towards the example set by the Prophet Muhammad (peace and blessings be upon him). This is essential when Muslims are experiencing a culture of hate and facing increasingly serious violence in Egypt, Bahrain, the Central African Republic, Indonesia, Iraq, Kashmir, Malaysia, Myanmar, Pakistan, Palestine, and Syria, as well as countries in the West such as the UK, France and the USA, to name just a few.

This year IHRC has worked on numerous issues around the world, but one of the key areas has been that of the sectarianism that appears to be flourishing in Malaysia and Indonesia. Following a recent fact-finding mission to these countries, it has become clear that Saudi Arabia is spending vast sums of money across the region in order to spread disunity and sectarian strife. There is no basis for trying to redefine what constitutes a Muslim following the signing of the Amman Declaration by ulema around the world, accepted by governments and registered with the United Nations. In collaboration with the Universal Justice Network, IHRC will be producing a report with the intention of working with Malaysian and Indonesian politicians and activists, as well as the United Nations, to encourage a more just and open society for their citizens.

The UK has provided arms in the way of trade agreements to the ruling family which have been used against the Bahraini people. Additionally, Bahrain is home the to the UK's largest naval base in the Middle East, making it all the more reluctant to criticise the Bahraini regime.

This hypocrisy is echoed in Britain's stance on Egypt, where despite the overthrow of the country's first democratically elected President, our government has expressed support for a new military regime which has sentenced hundreds uals of it own citizens to death.

Within Britain we are also seeing difficulties for Muslim communities. While attacks following the Woolwich murder of

viduals at ports around the country. IHRC has lobbied particularly as it is used in a targeted way towards Muslims, and is also used as a means of recruiting informants, a clear breach of protocol. However, changes have been made to the legislation which provides for a less invasive experience when stopped under the power. This includes the requirement to have a solicitor present if you are detained under Schedule 7. IHRC has recently launched a Know Your Rights app on Schedule 7 for Android and Apple phones and tablets to allow for easy and immediate access to this information. Fighting discrimination

IHRC has also actively lobbied against the proposed powers for the Home Secretary to remove British citizenship from naturalised individuals. Under the guise of national security, this places an inordinate amount of power in the hands of one individual, and indirectly discriminates against non-white citizens. The government has made minor concessions, agreeing that an Independent Reviewer will oversee the procedure. However, we should still be deeply concerned about a clear trend within government to ignore concerns that policies could result in serious human rights abuses, which

in this case, would render individ-

government and policymakers on such issues, as we did with the successful campaign to have body scanners removed from airports that were truly invasive in their capturing of nude images of travellers, again under the pretext of national security.

In order to better understand the detrimental impact these attacks are having on Muslims in the UK IHRC recently conducted a survey of experiences of hate crimes within our communities. This followed the pilot hate crime project in 2009. The latter will be compared to the former in order to give our supporters as well as those in power a more accurate picture of the situation as it stands. This is particularly important as the policy following Woolwich was to leave against themselves summer of 2013 there were

These acts included those carried out against fourteen mosques across the country. These statistics need to be utilised to stress to the government the poisonous nature of its rhetoric and policies, and that they are detrimental to the Muslim population of Britain. Additionally, our figures from 2009 demonstrate that 13.9 percent of survey respondents had been victims of violent physical assault. With the aftermath of Woolwich this number will have no doubt increased, highlighting the inadequacies of government-sponsored organisations which dangerously downplay the actual suffering Muslim communities experience at the hands of Islamophobes.

As part of this project we have just launched our most recent report on hate crimes in Canada. It is part of a series that includes a focus on the USA, France and Germany, as well as more Muslims the UK, in order to build up a

clearer picture of anti-Muslim crimes in the West, something that is not taken seriously by these governments.

These projects represent just a small part of the work that IHRC conducts every day, a clear indicator of the fact that the experience of Muslims around the world is still worsening. That is why we rely on the support of our commu-nity and people like you. We ask that you increase your support to tackle the increasing problems we face by giving generously and keeping us in your prayers.

Conflict resolution

IHRC's ground-breaking conflict resolution programme culminated in the Bodrum Declaration signed last year, uniting the ulema in Pakistan in their commitment to overcoming the rising levels of sectarianism within the country and the subsequent violence that ensues from such rhetoric. IHRC has always and continues to address the needs and aspirations of the community and support all according to their need rather than nationality, creed, or indeed even religion.

Bahrain is also experiencing major internal struggles, with protests violently quelled by security forces, arrests, imprisonment and impositions of the

Drummer Lee Rigby continue, they are further fuelled by an irresponsible government and a hostile media. In recent weeks we have seen a recurrence of 'halal hysteria' and the falsified 'Trojan Horse' story. On top of that we have the government declaring that it is for the 'public good' to monitor the actions of Muslims in general, even to the point where it is encouraging teachers to spy on students and mothers to spy on their children in order to identify traits of extremism, as though it is an inherent feature of the Muslim character. In addition the government has failed to

he department has been busy this year, providing back-up to the campaign and advocacy departments and presenting work to the United Nations and other fora.

A number of our briefings have been translated into various languages, including Spanish, French, Italian and Farsi.

In addition to supporting work to the DHMIR project on hate crimes like the briefing 'Assessing Hate Crimes and Backlash for Policy Change', IHRC has put together briefings on increasing securitisation, and the continued framing of Muslims as a terrorism threat. 'British Muslims: The Suspect Community?' and the IHRC Response to Tackling Extremism in the UK, a government report, responded to new proposals and measures that target Muslims in the UK.

IHRC also put together a briefing based on its own experiences of much research this year. Aside complaining about misrepresenta-

IHRC Research tion. The briefing highlighted how media organisations can use and abuse the idea of free speech and investigative journalism and the limited effectiveness of existing complaint mechanisms.

'Is Islamophobia a Form of 'Decolonising Racism?' and France', in both English and Italian, presented the views of Ramon Grosfoguel and Houria Bouteldja respectively in the field of decolonial studies, looking at the continued impact of colonial systems on the world today.

The department also provided support to the Campaigns and UN sections of IHRC putting together briefings on Mumia Abu Jamal and Lynne Stewart, as well as highlighting their cases and those of Aafia Siddiqui, Imam Jamil and the Holy Land Five. Alhamdulillah the release of Lynne Stewart at the end of 2013 was a blessing that boosted morale amongst campaigners.

IHRC Bookshop & Gallery report

t's been another eventful year at the IHRC Bookshop & Gallery. In September 2013, October 2013 and May 2014 we were delighted to hold more Decolonising the Mind courses led by Sandew Hira from the International Institute for Scientific Research in Holland. Hira is a leading critic of the new colonial discourse and legacy of colonialism.

In October 2013, in conjunction with SOAS-2 (the School of occidental and Aryan Studies) and the Assat-Tupac Liberation School, we started a year long course conducted by Dr Syed Mustafa Ali, a lecturer in the Computing Department of The Open University (UK) whose academic research focuses on investigating issues at the intersection of critical race theory/ decolonial studies and computing/ ICT.

In December 2013, we were delighted to welcome back Professor Ramón Grosfoguel the from University of

California, Berkeley. Following on from last year's event 'Is Islamophobia a form of Racism?', Ramon elaborated on his thesis that race was the organising principle through which hierarchies operated to colonise and continue to control peoples around the world.

Ín February 2014 Pat Winslow and Mark Marqusee to talk about a new poem by Talha Ahsan, the Asperger's sufferer who was deported from the UK to the US in 2012 to be tried so-called terrorism under charges.

Our regular author evenings included Soldier Box, held in August 2013, by ex-soldier Joe J. Glenton. Glenton reveals why he left the army, and the personal war he faced fighting for his convictions. What he saw overseas in

different countries left him disillusioned and he returned suffering from symptoms of post-traumatic stress disorder.

In March 2014 we welcomed back Arun Kundani who talked about his new book "The Muslims Are Coming" that deals with the so-called domestic war on terror in various countries.

Our most recent author evening in June 2014 was with Dan Glazebook (June 2014) in which he talked about his new book 'Divide and Ruin' dealing with the development and refinement of 'western' strategy in relation to the Global South.

Our upcoming author evening will be our second one with Salman Sayyid who will discuss his new book "Recalling the Caliphate" in which he analyses the displacements and invasions



This year we also screened various documentaries. In January 2014 we screened Turab Shah's film, Zone Of The Non-Being: Guantanamo, made for IHRC about Guantanamo Bay and how it represented a physical manifestation of Fanon's Zone of Non-Being. The film was based on the thesis that the war on terror is a continuation of colonial policy that Fanon so comprehensively exposed.

In March 2014 Sheena and Sonum Sumaria's film "Even the Crows: A Divided Gujarat" traced their journey from London to the USA and Gujarat in North-West India, as they uncovered the grisly and depressing backdrop and aftermath of the anti-Muslim riots in 2002.

This year the gallery also screened documentary-maker Roshan Salih's film "Travelling by Muslim", which looked at the workings of the notorious British anti-terrorism measure, Schedule 7.

We also had more storytelling sessions with Zainab Zahra, including a reading of Ilyas & the Duck and other stories, and her own work, The Kind Traveller about the travels of the young Che Guevara.

The IHRC Gallery hosted a verse array of art exhibitions including 'Visionary Awakening' by Nasreen Sheikh Jamal Al-Layl (September 2013 to early March), a mixed media installation that reflected the artist's experiences as a product of Saudi and British culture. Our current exhibition is Another Day by Sara Russell which will conclude in September 2014. The photo exhibition is based on the young photographer's visit to Palestine. Documenting the effects and causes of anti-Muslim hatred: **Focus on Canada** and the UK

HRC's groundbreaking work into Islamophobia continued this year. Saied R. Ameli and Arzu Merali's book 'Only Canadian: The Experience of Hate Moderated Differential Hate Citizenship for Muslims' provided a stark overview of the situation in Canada, based on fieldwork including two surveys undertaken in 2012. Published in May 2014, the book has received some great reviews. Among its

findings was that only 2% of Muslims surveyed said they had never had a hate experi-ence. Overall, some 10% said they had experienced a physical attack, but other types of experiences included verbal abuse, seeing negative stereotypes about Muslims on TV, and being denied servic-

The ubiquity of hatred across Muslim communities in Canada was alarming given the perception of Canada as a tolerant, multicultural country. A review of existing literature showed that discriminaliterature tion against Muslims in the field of employment had been well documented from the 1980s until the present day, with Muslims likely to earn up to one third less than their counterparts in the majority community in the same job / with the same qualifica-tions. The authors of

the book argued that Muslims were suffering from ingrained prejudices that are foundational to the idea of Canada, and which can be seen to affect many other communities in Canada, not least the First Nations.

The underlying theory of the project developed by Ameli – the Domination Hate Model of Intercultural Relations – argues that hate attacks, crimes and acts of discrimination are not random acts of deranged individuals. it maintains that those Rather, people who commit such acts are provoked to do so by an environment of hatred caused by policy, media and law that targets a hated society. In the studies undertaken by IHRC so far in the UK, France, the USA and Canada, the hated society whose experiences are analysed are Muslim communities. DHMIR also argues that individuals who commit hate acts as a result of a hate environment are also victims in that they are incited by those they trust. This year, IHRC is re-running this project in the UK. At the time of publication collection of questionnaires from the UK will be drawing to an end, with a small window of opportunity for anyone still wanting to do so. IHRC is the only organisation to have carried out academically rigorous studies on this subject



IHRC is the only organisation to have carried out academically rigorous studies on this subject in order to be able to present reliable statistics about the levels of anti-Muslim hated experienced by communities. IHRC is hoping to extend this project to Australia next year, and re-run it in France in 2015.

Additional work on France based on the findings of IHRC's pilot project there in 2009 - 2010 was presented to the First Annual

Islamophobia Paris' Conference in December 2013. An outline of why DHMIR methodology is such an important concept was published in Ceasefire magazine and can be found here: http://ceasefire magazine.co.uk / race-organis-ing-principle-functionality-islamophobia-today/

As with so many of our projects, this one was developed on a small budget. Part of the aim was to be able to provide grassroots community groups (whether docu-menting hatred against Muslims or other outgroups) with a method-ology for collecting data. The reviews of the DHMIR publications have indicated that the project fills a void left by governmental failures to record anti-Muslim hatred.

Decoloniality Europe – Two years of moving forward

Decoloniality he Europe Network developed further this year with the introduction at its 3rd annual meeting of a model on working practice. The Network brings together organisations from across the continent that work within a similar framework of tackling the legacy of colonialism in various Organisations forms. involved from range grassroots local advocacy initiatives, to academic organsiations.

Meeting for the first time outside of Spain, this year in Amsterdam through the facilitation of the International Institute of Scientific Research, the key organisations of the network including the organisers of the meeting, Parti des Indigenes de la Republique Dialogo Global, and outlined some modalities of working and future projects.

Existing and new organisations within the network also put forward ideas for co-operation based on existing work across the



coming year, including on December 2013, there will be collaborating in campaigns in Portugal and the Netherlands.

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Genocide **Memorial Day** 2014 expands to new European cities

HRC's annual Genocide Memorial Day saw a few exciting developments this year, especially as it was held in four cities: London, Amsterdam, Lisbon and Paris, reflecting the development of this important event internationally and how it has captured the imagination of wider sections of people.

As IHRC's Raza Kazim stated during the introduction of GMD, the event is about opposing and looking into 'man's inhumanity to man' irrespective of who is the perpetrator of the genocide or genocidal act(s) and irrespective of the victim. IHRC rejects the notion that there is a hierarchy of victimhood depending on people's background.

GMD is commemorated on the third Sunday of every January to coincide with Israel's genocidal act of 'Operation Cast Lead' during Dec/Jan 2008/2009 against the Palestinian people of Gaza.

It was wonderful to be able to have speakers from across the world including Tjanara Goreng Goreng who participated via internet from Australia. Goreng is a leading rights advocate for the indigenous people of Australia. Mrs Goreng's contribution focused on "how our struggle will overcome apartheid and forced assimilation since 1788 until now" Political activist and rapper Marcel Cartier recited one of his pieces written at the time of Operation Cast Lead, which included the lyrics: "Is it a horrible end, or an end to the horror? All out war, or a stop to the slaughter? People in Palestine being oppressed, little kids being bombed and maimed to death. Yet they bulldoze houses with families in them, that's straight state sanctioned terrorism. Where your land's been stolen and identity crushed." Michel Warschawaski of The Alternative Information Centre, an anti-Zionist organisation in Jerusalem,

spoke on the relative sophistication of genocides in our times compared to the more brutal and direct ones of the colonial

Dr Sibtain Panjwani spoke of the fact that genocides don't develop overnight, they have innocuous beginnings. Tyrants do not hide their steps towards genocide; however a more sophisticated despot is aware that steps towards genocide cannot take place with the support of many people hence they

A now frequent visiting friend of IHRC, Professor Ramon Grofoguel, quoted from Aime Cesaire's work 'Discourse on Colonialism' written in 1950: "A civilisation that proves incapable of solving the problems it creates is a decadent civilisation. A civilisation that chooses to close its eyes to its most crucial problems is a stricken civilisation. A civilisation that uses its principles for trickery and deceit is a dying civilisation." To highlight the profound hypocrisy of the 'colonial matrix of power' Prof Grosfoguel explained that those who seemed to celebrate the life and struggles of Nelson Mandela are the same people who have gone on to salute the Zionist war criminal, Ariel Sharon.

Empowering the community: KnowYour Rights

ast summer I went for a job interview at IHRC for the position of Caseworker and PA to the the Chair.

During the interview I was asked why I wanted to work at IHRC? I responded by expressing my long-standing admiration of the work IHRC had done against implementation of the the Terrorism Act 2000 that served to criminalise the Muslim community and by extension wider society, as well as other so-called counter-terrorism law/policy.

In particular I talked about the pioneering work IHRC had done in producing leaflets detailing people's rights if stopped at ports/borders under Schedule 7 of the Act.

Since non-white Muslims first arrived in Britain they have been criminalised and subjected to targeted questioning – including about their immigration status - as well as stop and search. Despite this fact most people do not know what the law permits officers to do and what they are permitted to do in response. For example thousands of young Muslim men were racially profiled and selected for stop and search under Section 44 of the Terrorism Act 2000. The police used it as an opportunity to harass Muslim communities as well as gather intelligence. One of the key ways this was done was by gathering people's names, addresses and other personal information. Many of you reading this will have experienced stop and search under the power. Yet few will know that although police are entitled to ask for someone's name and address, there is no requirement upon anyone who is stopped and searched to provide their details under the power! And even they are aware of their rights many don't know how they can be effectively invoked without aggravating the situation. Consider this. Most women prepare for the possibility that they may be sexually harassed walking home late at night. For example they carry rape alarms and take precautions like walking in groups with friends and crossing the road when they see men. Similarly most non-white men in London know that there is a very real possibility that they may be targeted for harassment by a police force previously called institutionally racist. Yet – apart from knowledge of one's rights there is a lack of advice about prac-tical precautions that can be taken

for a number of groups from a broad cross section of society, both Muslim and non-Muslim, including attendants at the Decolonising the Mind workshops at IHRC, the International Community Project at the University of Westminster Students' Union, Refugee Youth, the London Campaign against Police and State Violence (LCAPSV), Birmingham Ethnic Minority Association (BEMA), Shipman Youth Centre, the National Union of Students (NUS) Black Students Campaign (BSC) amongst others.

At the same time we have launched a smartphone app detailing our rights when stopped under Schedule 7 which is avail-able for both android and i-phone devices. This makes accessing our rights both easier and more accessible.

We have also been able to use our training on demonstrations to successfully train a set of volunteers to steward the annual United Friends and Families Campaign March to End Deaths in Custody. Our role prevented any amplification of the pain of families/friends that have lost loved ones at the hands of the police. Recently, due to the popularity of our workshops we were asked to collaborate with other groups in developing workshops and other training materials. We are pleased to announce that we are working with Stopwatch and other groups as part of a project entitled 'YSTOP' aimed at getting young people to know their rights if stopped and searched.. In the future, we are expanding the range of Know Your Rights leaflets we offer and the content of our app. In addition with legal aid cuts starting to bite there is a need for more voluntary organisations to do the work that lawyers previously did. As a result we are developing training workshops on how to make complaints to police and other statutory bodies.

dealt with a variety of housing problems, benefits complaints and family disputes, to experiences of Islamophobia in schools, prisons, and local authorities, as well as serious hate crime incidents.

Discrimination in schools

The Advocacy department recently helped a family successfully challenge a Manchester primary school's decision not to permit their children to pray. Over the summer holidays the parents had actively encouraged their two primary-aged children to maintain their daily prayers, so much so that they expressed the wish to continue to pray once the new term had started. Their respective form tutors made unofficial arrangements to accommodate this need. However, once the headteacher caught wind of the situation she put a stop to it, claiming that staff were not available to supervise. She compromised by allowing the children to be removed from school premises during their lunch break. This meant the parents had to collect their children and drop them back within 45 minutes. Pointing out these difficulties to the school, as well as the discriminatory aspect of this provision was key. It was clear that the policy of allowing the children to pray at home put Muslims at a disadvantage. That prayers are obligatory meant that the children had no choice but to leave the school, missing out on their under review by the relevant playtime with their classmates, a key part of their education and development. We successfully argued, on the parents' behalf, that this amounted to religious discrimination. Following this, the school conceded and has since made provisions to enable the children to pray in an allo-cated room while being supervised by teachers.

Difficulties while travelling

We have dealt with several cases where British Muslims have experienced harassment and humiliation while travelling abroad. It is of concern to IHRC that there appears to be an inequality in the way in which British citizens are treated abroad, and that those who are not white may experience challenges to free movement.

Muslim passengers have also experienced difficulties in British airports, with Schedule 7 stops still prevalent. IHRC has campaigned extensively against this piece of legislaand has lobbied tion, Parliament to restrict the powers if not overturn them entirely. One case suggests a systematic targeting of an individual, who has been stopped seven times over a period of six years. He has been sub-jected to humiliating stops and invasive questioning relating to his religious practices.

Hate crimes

We have received several cases of reported Islamophobic physical attacks. One such incident was targeted at a of woman Muslim in Birmingham in a shopping centre frequented by many who visibly appeared to be Muslims. She was punched in the head from behind by another woman who shouted racist abuse at her before proceeding to walk out of the shop. Despite the viciousness of this attack, the police were slow to respond, and to locate

dealt with inexpertly and inefficiently by police forces, which has led to the victims feeling helpless. IHRC hopes to continue to put pressure on these agencies to implement strategies that deter potential assailants, and can also ensure when incidents occur that they are dealt with swiftly and in the best interests of the victims and society at large.

Discrimination in social services

In recent months the Advocacy department has noted with concern the number of cases where Muslim parents have had their children taken away from them by social services. Whilst we note local authorities' duty to ensure the safety of children, it is disturbing to hear some of the racist comments made by social workers to these families, and the subsequent insensitivity towards parents who have requested that their children are placed with family members, or at the very least, a Muslim family.

One case involves the removal of a three-month old baby from her distraught parents, and when they requested she was placed with a Muslim family they were accused of discriminating against 'white British' foster parents. It is unfortunate that agencies which exist to serve the needs of the family, cannot appreciate the desire of Muslim families to ensure their children are always placed in an environment where their faith is practised, and instead equate such a desire with racial prejudice. This case is currently being contested and a complaint has been lodged against the offending local authority.

It is clear from the number calls the department receives every day that the need for advocacy for Muslims' rights in the UK is in huge demand. The diversity of cases that come our way, and the multitude of ways in which Muslims experience discrimination is something we see increasing dramatically. Over the coming year the Advocacy department will work closely with the newly-

IHRC launches new

legal department

n the wake of devastating cuts to the civil legal aid budget, with more to follow for criminal legal aid, the last year also saw the launch of IHRC's latest initiative, IHRC Legal.

The Legal Aid, Sentencing and Punishment of Offenders Act 2012, which came into force in April 2013 amid fierce opposition, has limited the scope of public funding for: most private family cases (except those involving evidenced domestic violence, child abuse or abduction); welfare benefits; clinical negligence; employment; housing disputes (other than serious disrepair, homelessness or antisocial behaviour); debt; immigration; and education (except special needs cases).



Recognising that this has created the urgent need for high quality and affordable legal advice services we have launched IHRC Legal.

IHRC legal is a legal consultancy project focusing on Employment and Discrimination law, with plans to offer immigration advice in the near future. We specialise in discrimination, unfair dis-

missal, breach of contract and wrongful dismissal claims, unlawful deduction of wages, grievances, support during disciplinary and investigatory proceedings and representation at the Employment Tribunal.

We also work with small to medium businesses and charities seeking to develop their organisation through formalising their contracts of employment and workplace policies, as well as advising on ongoing HR issues including anticipating or defending Employment Tribunal claims.

Bangladesh

The past year saw civic values in Bangladesh being assaulted under the authoritarian rule of the Awami League. Under the International Crimes Tribunal (ICT), set up in 2010, the ruling Awami League convicted many Jamaat-e-Islaami leaders charged with war crimes committed during the 1971 war.

The ICT has been condemned by human rights organisations and opposition groups for failing to meet international standards of jus-tice and for allegedly being used as a tool to weaken political rivals. Many top leaders of the Jamaat, including Ghulam Azam, Maulana

Motiur Rahman Nizami and Delwaar Hussein Sayadee have been sentenced to death or prison. One former leader, Abdul Kader Mullah, was hanged in December 2013. Their only 'crime' was their open opposition of the separation of East and West Pakistan into independent states.

Not surprisingly the campaign

to neutralise Bangladesh's opposition has provoked massive political disquiet and social unrest in the country. 5th May 2013 will go down in Bangladeshi history as one of the country's bloodiest days as scores of protesters supporting the Jamaat were killed by police forces.

IHRC wrote several alerts protesting against the blatantly unjust ICT and unfair detention of apparently innocent civilians. IHRC will keep a close eye on the political situation in Bangladesh and report to campaigners in the future.

Bulgaria

IHRC pressurised the Bulgarian government to take action against the Islamophobic attack on the historic mosque of Plovdiv by around 3000 protesters on 14th of February 2014. IHRC urged campaigners to write letters to the Bulgarian government requesting that it protects the rights of Bulgarian Muslims and their religious symbols.

United Kingdom

IHRC campaigned against the British PM David Cameron's decision to order an investigation into the Muslim Brotherhood with the intention of discovering the group's alleged links to ter-rorism. Following violent incidents in Egypt, on 1 April 2014, the British PM ordered an investigation into the Muslim Brotherhood to determine whether or not the group was responsible for terrorist activities and whether it is using Britain as a base from which to plan them. Many of the group's leaders fled to Britain after a brutal crackdown was launched against them by Egyptian authorities in the summer of 2013. IHRC believes that the PM's decision represents direct support for the military coup. Hence we urged campaigners to write letters to the PM asking him to can-cel the review and instead take diplomatic action against the current rulers for their part in overthrowing a democratically elected government and bringing back military rule.

BOYCOTT **ISRAELI DATES**

Key Facts

• Over 50% of the worlds Medjoul dates are produced in Israel. • 60% of Israeli dates are grown on illegal settlement plantations in the

• If you buy a Medjoul date, there's a strong possibility that it is from an illegal settlement - grown on stolen land.

Settlements

Israeli settlements built on stolen Palestinian land have been ruled illegal by the International Court of Justice. Nearly half of the settlements in the Jordan Valley grow dates, its their most profitable crop, and contributes signifi-cantly to their economic viability. If you oppose the settlements target their dates.

Exploitation

Picking of the dates is hard work, Israeli settlers bring in low payed Palestinian labourers to do this back breaking work. During the pruning season, workers are dropped on the date palm trees by a hoisting crane at 5am, left perched on palms that soar to heights of 12 metres - equivalent to a four storey building, left there swaying in the wind for up to 8 hours without even a toilet break. With no means to come down until the crane returns at the end of the day, the workers cling to the tree with one arm and work with the other to meet their quota. If they fall behind they will lose their jobs.

Child Labour

The Israelis prefer to employ children – even issuing them official work permits, as they can climb trees faster, work for less and it's easier to cheat and humiliate them. Out of desperate poverty Palestinian families are forced to take their children out of school and hand them over to the settlers to work for a pittance.

Guilty Companies

Hadiklaim, the Israeli Date Growers Cooperative, which includes illegal settler plantations in the Jordan Valley, sells 70% of all Israeli dates. Its brand names include Jordan River, King Solomon, Tamara Barhi Dates, Desert Diamond, Rapunzel, Bomaja, Shams and Delilah. They also supply Israeli dates to super-markets who market them under their own brand. These include Marks & Spencer, Sainsbury's, Tesco, Asda and Waitrose. Sometimes they are labelled "produced in the West Bank", remem-ber these are not Palestinian dates. Hadiklaim have also sold South African dates with profits going to Israel, but due to the boycott their South African partner Karsten Farms have now cut ties and vowed never to partner with any Israeli entity complicit in the occupation.

Mehadrin, Israel's largest fresh produce exporter, last year boasted of doubling its Medjoul date sales citing strong demand in Ramadan! Their dates have the brand names Premium Medjoul, Fancy Medjoul,

Royal Treasure, Red Sea, and Bonbonierra. Sometimes their packaging states "Grown by Palestinian Farmers" - this refers to Palestinian 'slave' labourers found on Israeli plantations.

Boycott, Divest, Sanctions Call

In 2005 Palestinian civil society organisations initiated a call for people of conscience around the world to Boycott, Divest and Sanction Israel until it complies with international law and Palestinian rights. The call was endorsed by over 170 Palestinian organisations representing all aspects of society including farmers.

Plea From Palestine

Activists visiting the Palestinian village of Fasayl in the Jordan Valley discovered that villagers are slowly being forced off their land by the Israeli army for settlement expansion. The only work left open to them is to on Israeli settlements. The Palestinians whose land had been stolen and were forced to work for Agrexco (including two children under the age of 12), in order to feed their families had a message for the activists, a plea for anyone who would listen: take action against the companies that support Israeli apartheid. What excuse is left for us not to boycott Israel?
